

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The Alfred Kugel Collection



Alfred Kugel, of Hinsdale, Illinois, was one of philately's preeminent military postal historians. His great interest was in the envelopes that carried mail to and from battlefields, "actions," and their aftermaths, particularly in Europe between 1900 and 1950. He avidly sought material whose addresses

and postal markings told the story of the events with which he was concerned.

His scholarship and his ability to acquire outstanding material were brilliantly displayed in over 50 multiframe and 100 single-frame exhibits, many of which won gold medals at various levels, including national and international stamp shows. He was also a prolific philatelic author, was a nationally accredited exhibits judge, and was deeply involved with many of the hobby's top organizations.

The same focus is seen in the banknotes offered in this sale, mainly acquired by Mr. Kugel between 25 and 50 years ago. Principally from European countries, the banknotes are from areas and periods of political and military turmoil: wars, occupations, the emergence of new political entities, etc. Included is material from Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Danzig, Estonia, Fiume, Germany, Latvia, Romania, Russia, Tannu Tuva and Ukraine. Non-European material includes banknotes from China (especially the German-Asiatic Bank), German East Africa, Japan (especially after the 1905 war with Russia: occupation of Siberia, etc.), New Caledonia and New Hebrides.

The items include early ad-hoc notes and beautifully engraved notes (both issued and in proof and specimen form). Many of these are scarce or rare, and some appear to be unique. Many complete sets are included. The condition of the items is noteworthy; most appear to be XF or uncirculated. Those of lesser condition are probably scarcer banknotes, for which these are the "best available."

AFGHANISTAN. Da Afghanistan Bank. 1000 Afghanis, ND (1939). P-27As. Specimen. PMG Very Fine 25. The only specimen of this high denomination in the PMG population report. While this example was obviously mishandled over the years (some might say 'used for its purpose') it is still rare in this format and will no doubt fill a challenging slot in an advanced Afghanistan specimen collection.

ALBANIA. Banca Nazionale d'Albania. 5 Franga, ND (1939). P-6s. Specimen. PMG Superb Gem Uncirculated 67 EPQ. The sole finest example in the PMG population report and just three specimens graded in total for the type. Unlike modern Albanian specimens, classic notes such as this are difficult to locate in specimen form. An attractive and entirely original example with good eye appeal.

The Portuguese Colony of Angola had a fairly significant banknote issuance in the early 20th century, but survivors of many types are rare. Numerous seal varieties exist for this denomination. The type offered here has the 'Filial Em Loanda' seal type and is surpassed in the PMG population report by just two finer examples, out of a grand total of 12 graded.

ANGOLA. Provincia de Angola. 5 Angolars, 14.8.1926. P-66a. PCGS Banknote Choice About Uncirculated 58 EPQ. By far the nicest example of this popular type from Portuguese Angola your cataloger has ever seen. Just the faintest touch of circulation but with excellent color and plenty of originality remaining. A single centerfold accounts for he grade, but it is fairly light and does not break the paper.

ARGENTINA. Banco Nacional. 100 Pesos, 1.1.1888. P-S1097p1. BNG-7pp. Front Proof. PMG Choice Uncirculated 63. Printed by Bradbury, Wilkinson & Co. An ultra elusive high denomination proof from the 1888 Banco Nacional series. The Bauman reference lists three dates of this type but assigns each an "R-7" rarity rating, indicating 1-5 known, and pictures a specimen. No issued notes have been graded by PMG, except for a contemporary counterfeit. This progressive proof is listed as "R-8", or "unknown". This example has been pasted on an oversized piece of paper. A red "CANCELLED" stamp and printer's annotations are seen. An important opportunity for the South American specialist. PMG Comments "Printer's Annotations."

AUSTRALIA. Commonwealth Bank of Australia. 1 Pound, ND (1933-38). P-22. R28. PMG Choice About Uncirculated 58 EPQ. Riddle - Sheehan signature combination. Just the faintest hint of circulation is seen on this classic Australian 1 Pound note from Australia dating back to the 1930s. Unlike many such notes this example is entirely original with the coveted "EPQ" status awarded as a result.

AUSTRALIA. Reserve Bank of Australia. 1 Dollar, ND (1966). P-37ar. R71s. Replacement. PCGS Banknote Choice Uncirculated 64. Coombs - Wilson signature combination. Replacement notes from Australia have long been a favorite with collectors and are deceptively scarce in any grade. Here is a nice uncirculated example of the first \$1 variety issued with ZAE prefix and star suffix.

We have found few offerings of this type at public auction, and this is the first time in our lengthy auction history that we have been able to offer this type. Not to be missed. PMG Comments "Previously Mounted."

A handsome and fully original note perfect for an advanced type collection.

Just three examples of this type have been graded at the Superb Gem Uncirculated level (none finer), and two are offered in this lot, as a consecutive pair. This attractive and colorful type has the same basic design on both sides, with one side in German and the other in Hungarian.

AZORES. Banco de Portugal. 10 Mil Reis Ouro, 1905. P-10s. Specimen. PMG About Uncirculated 55. In the early 20th century, the Azores used similar notes to those used on the Portuguese mainland, but with an overprint and in different colors. This specimen printed by the Banco de Portugal lacks the overprint but is seen in the blue color of the Azores issue. Handwritten printer's annotations confirm that this is a specimen of the Azores issue. Because of their limited population, notes from the Azores are much scarcer than those with the same designs from Portugal. As can be expected for a specimen that was actively used in the design process, this has some light handling, but also retains strong originality and eye appeal for the type. PMG Comments "Printer's Annotations."

BAHAMAS. Bahamas Government. 4 Shillings, 1919 (ND 1935). P-5. PMG Very Fine 25 EPQ. A classic type from the Bahamas, while seen with some frequency, is seldom original enough to warrant the 'EPQ' designation from PMG. This evenly circulated and attractive example is a noteworthy exception. Out of 37 notes graded as of the time of cataloging it is one of just two notes that have been awarded the EPQ designation in all grades combined.

BAHAMAS. Bahamas Government. 10 Shillings, 1919 (ND 1930). P-6. PMG Choice Very Fine 35 EPQ. As mentioned in the previous lot, seldom do notes of this series receive the 'EPQ' designation from PMG. Here is an attractive example of the 10/- Shillings that is surpassed in the PMG population report by just two finer examples. This type was introduced into circulation in 1930 and was only issued with the A/1 prefix.

BAHAMAS. Lot of (8) in Booklet. Bahamas Monetary Authority. 50 Cents, 1, 3, 5, 10, 20, 50 & 100 Dollars, 1968. P-26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32 & 33. Specimens. Uncirculated. Collector's series specimen set from the Bahamas in original folder. Specimen overprint and punch hole cancellations are seen on all notes. Seldom seen in the original folder, this is an excellent opportunity to acquire the complete set.

BAHAMAS. Central Bank of the Bahamas. 100 Dollars, 1974. P-41b. PMG Very Fine 30. Allen signature. The highest denomination issued in the Bahamas then and now and a challenging type regardless of date of issue. The Allen signature seen here is the final issue of this design, which had first been introduced in 1965 and would remain in circulation until it was replaced in the mid-1980s with a modernized design. A key Caribbean note always in demand and seen here in pleasing yet relatively affordable Very Fine condition.

BAHAMAS. Central Bank of the Bahamas. 50 Dollars, ND (ca. 1986). P-Unlisted. Back Printer's Model. PMG Uncirculated 62. Possibly unique, this printer's model for an unissued design of a \$50 from the Bahamas is unlike anything we have ever seen. None of the design elements match any of the issued designs of the country, although we suspect this dates to the mid-1980s when a new series of notes was being prepared, although it is possible this was prepared earlier, perhaps around 1974 when the Central Bank was established. The central design element features three ocean liners. PMG Comments "Pieces Missing."

BAHAMAS. Central Bank of the Bahamas. 20 Dollars, 1974 (ND 1993). P-54A. PMG Gem Uncirculated 66 EPQ. A deceptively difficult modern type from the Bahamas. This denomination went through a number of design changes and the earlier varieties (prior to 1997) are deceptively scarce. An important type and difficult to find in better grades.

BAHRAIN. Bahrain Currency Board. 1/2 Dinar, 1964. P-3a. PMG Superb Gem Uncirculated 67 EPQ. From the first series of Bahrain. Scarce and popular at this grade level with just two graded finer.

BARBADOS. Government of Barbados. 1 Dollar, 1.6.1943. P-2b. PMG Gem Uncirculated 65 EPQ. Tied for finest in the PMG population report. A stealthily difficult type from the Caribbean at this grade level. Keen observers may notice the similarity of this type with Egypt P-21 (50 Piastres 1935-51), which shares many of the same design elements. Both types were printed in England by Bradbury, Wilkinson & Co. No new orders were placed for this denomination until 1949, assuring that most entered circulation and remained there for quite some time.

BARBADOS. Government of Barbados. 1 Dollar, 1.1.1949. P-2c. PCGS Banknote About Uncirculated 55. The last date of this type in high grade. A year after this note was issued, notes from the British Caribbean Territories Currency Board entered circulation, and Barbados would not issue its own currency again until the 1970s. Scarce at this grade level.

BELGIAN CONGO. Banque du Congo Belge. 20 Francs, 26.7.1926. P-10d. PMG Very Fine 25. Matadi branch. A wholesome circulated 20-Franc note from the Belgian Congo. The grading service mentions a small tear in the left margin, but it barely touches the design, and does little to detract from the overall appearance of this piece. Comments "Tear."

BELGIAN CONGO. Banque du Congo Belge. 50 Francs, 1950. P-16hs. Specimen. PMG Gem Uncirculated 66 EPQ. Printed by the American Bank Note Company and an attractive type, seen here in specimen format. Similar to coins, this type was printed with a large number of different dates between 1941 and 1952.

BELGIAN CONGO. Banque du Congo Belge. 500 Francs, ND (1929). P-18s. Specimen. PMG About Uncirculated 55. Lightly (mis) handled type from Belgian Congo printed by the American Bank Note Company. Particularly attractive type with a vignette of elephants wading through a river on the back. This is the first iteration of this design, printed in the late 1920s, with "Serie 1" and printed in black. The more commonly seen version of this type is Pick-18A, printed in brown and issued in the 1940s.

BELGIAN CONGO. Banque du Congo Belge. 500 Francs, 1945. P-18Ac. PMG Very Fine 30. One of just five notes of this type graded by PMG as of the time of cataloging, with this example surpassed by just a single example in better grade. Minor repairs have preserved this note and have only helped with its appearance. This design was first printed in black, back in the late 1920s, before it was revived during World War II and printed in brown. Three different issues were printed, of which the 1945 emission seen here is the last, with a limited print run of just 200,000 notes. This type was printed in the United States by the American Bank Note Company and would remain in circulation in Belgian Congo until withdrawn from circulation in 1956. PMG Comments "Minor Repairs."

BELGIAN CONGO. Banque Centrale du Congo Belge et du Ruanda-Urundi. 50 Francs, 1952. P-24. PMG Very Fine 30 EPQ. Fully issued example from one of the final issues of Belgian Congo and, quite unusually, seen here in totally original condition. Out of fourteen issued notes graded by PMG, just three (including this piece) have been awarded 'EPQ' status by the grading service.

BELGIAN CONGO. Banque Centrale du Congo Belge et du Ruanda-Urundi. 1000 Francs, 15.9.1958. P-35. PCGS Banknote Gem Uncirculated 66 PPQ. The highest denomination from the final series of Belgian Congo and an astonishingly difficult note at the grade level. This type, which was printed with seven different dates, is virtually always seen with at least a centerfold. The final date had by far the largest print run, but this date had a print run of just 200,000 notes. Only the final date is sometimes seen in uncirculated grades, but the other dates are essentially unheard of at the uncirculated level and as such are unpriced in the new Martiny reference. An important offering not to be missed.

Its tenure in Bermuda commerce was short, however, as in February of 1943 another delivery of 5 Pound notes was made to Bermuda, but this time with the 5 Pound printed in orange (sometimes called 'canary').

Nelson Page Aspen, in the standard reference on Bermuda paper money (page 76) shares the details that prompted this change:

The color was an unfortunate choice. It was brown and beautiful, but caused considerable confusion when transacting business at night... Bermudians tell the story of some shoppers proudly displaying the new five pound note while making their purchase. At the conclusion of their purchase they would present the five shilling note (also brown) to the unsuspecting clerk, who in turn gave change for the higher denomination.

Not surprisingly, due to the high spending power, relatively few were put aside, and this is a **great rarity** today, missing from even the most advanced Bermuda collections. PMG has graded four notes of this type in total, with this and one other example (graded 64) the only uncirculated examples. This total includes the serial number 1 note of the type, which sold most recently for \$57,600 a few years ago. This piece, the **second-finest known**, features fresh paper and strong eye-appeal. Some barely discernable specks of rust can be seen in the margins on the back but do little to impact the overall appearance of this piece. A low 3-digit serial number is seen, further adding to the appeal of this piece. An exceptional offering for the Bermuda specialist, not to be missed. PMG Comments "Minor Rust."

Thanks to inflation, in the mid-1960s, the Bermuda Government saw it necessary to introduce a 10 Pound note into circulation. Previously, the highest denomination had been 5 Pounds. A single printing of 300,000 notes was prepared by Bradbury, Wilkinson & Co. and the notes were delivered on November 11th, 1964. Curiously, the emission records of this issue do not record the first 50,000 notes, and state that the next 50,000 were issued to the banks in June of 1966. This seems rather odd, and we suspect that the first 50,000 were indeed released (although Nelson Page Aspen does not believe so with certainty), but perhaps only slowly and in limited quantities.

Regardless, the present note is certainly one from the first delivery as it is seen here with an appealing and low 3-digit serial number. Additionally, it is one of the finest examples of this issue we have ever handled. Between the major grading services, only a few examples have graded 68 EPQ, and this is tied for finest at PCGS Banknote along with just one other. As can be expected, it shows absolutely no sign of circulation. Its embossing is strong, the colors are fresh, and its corners are sharp. The intricate engraving is vibrant and crisp. The British Caribbean Currency Board was established in 1950 and soon thereafter issued its first notes, which circulated throughout the Caribbean and in British Guiana. In preparation for that issue, perhaps even before the currency board was formally established, this hand drawn artist's rendition was prepared. It features elements that would make it onto the final design, but many other design elements are different, including the portrait of King George VI (the issued notes used a vignette of him in formal dress), and what we believe to be the portrait of Admiral Horatio Nelson at right as well as the artist's interpretation of the Battle of Cape St. Vincent. The color is predominantly yellow, blue and green. The heading shows "British Caribbean Colonies", which must have been the name considered before it became the "British Caribbean Territories". BRITISH GUIANA. Colony of Berbice. 1 Guilder, 1825. P-Unlisted. PMG Choice Fine 15. Collectors of the British Commonwealth may not be familiar with the Colony of Berbice. Notes from Berbice located in what is now the country of Guyana, are extremely rare. We are aware of a few remainders of lower denominations, including a piece in the British Museum, but this is the sole issued example, and the sole 1 Guilder, from this colony that we are aware of. The colony of Berbice was a de facto colony of Great Britain from 1803 to 1815 when the British occupied the former Dutch colony. The Dutch formally ceded Berbice to the British with the November 1815 ratification of the 1814 Anglo-Dutch Treaty. In 1831, Berbice merged with Essequibo & Demerara to form the new colony of British Guiana, which eventually became the country of Guiana.

This 1 Guilder, dated 1825, has a serial number and signatures that, while faded, remain partially visible. The counterfoil at left, seen on a few of the remainders, has been separated, and there is no doubt that this piece actually circulated in Berbice in the 1820s. As such, an extremely rare and possibly *unique* issued note from the Colony of Berbice. The note itself features a typical British printing of the period, printed uniface, and the fairly basic yet still attractive design shows a vignette of Justice at upper left, flanked by a decorative border. An incredible opportunity for the British Colonial or South American specialist and a historical rarity not to be missed.

One of five issued notes of this type in the PMG population report for the type, but the sole example above Very Fine 20 and the only example that has been awarded 'EPQ' status. A desirable type for collectors of the British Commonwealth, this note was issued in what is today Belize. This note is part of the third series. The first (extremely rare) series was issued in 1894, followed by an updated series the following year, which continued to be issued until 1920. That year a new design was introduced, which in 1924 saw a further update, introducing new colors. The \$2 denomination seen here was now printed in light brown, and issued with both 1924 and 1928 dates. This is an example of the 1928 date, which seems to have had a fairly limited print run. The serial numbers ran continuously for both dates, and the serial number seen on this example is the highest serial number recorded in the Banknote Book for the type. Signatures are of Edward Walker Evans, Hugh Arthur William Moulder, and Sydney Cuthbert.

In the 1920s, British Honduras remained a small but economically significant British colony reliant on forestry, particularly mahogany and logwood exports. The economy was heavily dependent on these industries, which had been the backbone of the colony for over a century. However, challenges such as fluctuating global demand and deforestation prompted some diversification efforts, including small-scale agriculture and chicle production for the chewing gum industry. The colonial government sought to improve infrastructure, such as roads and ports, to facilitate trade, though development was slow due to limited financial resources. It was here that this note saw some limited circulation, but quite unusually for any of the three early series, it has remained in entirely problem-free and original condition. An exceptional opportunity, not to be missed.



Why the masterpiece of the Italian Renaissance appeared on a lower-value Costa Rican note is unknown. Most likely, the vignette was specifically requested from Waterlow & Sons by an employee of the Banco Internacional de Costa Rica who had perhaps seen it on display during travels in Europe. The portrait of Mona Lisa by Leonardo da Vinci saw a resurgence in popularity in the 1930s, including two movies released that decade, based on the 1914 theft of the portrait and subsequent recovery. Still, when it comes to paper money, this is the only note that ever featured the portrait, which is now believed to have been Lisa del Giocondo, an Italian noblewoman born in 1479. While circulated notes of this type are seen from time to time it becomes much rarer in better grades. We have only handled a handful of notes of this type in grades above AU. The present piece is an exceptional Choice Uncirculated example that presents as a Gem Uncirculated note. No signs of circulation are evident; the colors are bright and the paper is fresh. 





Extremely rare in any grade, most examples seen are in heavily circulated condition, with this one in fantastic original uncirculated condition. A highly important offering and no doubt one of the highlights of the Danzig section in this catalog.

The back features an ink stamp that some may consider a cancellation, although we do not believe so, and it is found on several denominations of this series offered in the present sale. This particular piece is the sole finest in the PMG population report as of the time of cataloging and is one of just three uncirculated notes presently graded. It's as fresh as the day it was printed, and what appears to be a cancellation on the back does little to detract from the overall appearance of this piece and is much smaller than typical cancellations seen on this note. The key denomination of this important series from Danzig and the crowning jewel of this group in the Al Kugel Collection. An extremely rare type that was introduced into circulation after the others, in early December 1923, and was withdrawn less than half a year later, in April of 1924. A fairly non-obtrusive stamp cancellation is seen on the back. Good originality and paper quality is seen on this example. It is one of just four notes of this denomination in the PMG population report, all graded Choice Uncirculated 63 (one example was awarded the 'EPQ' designation from the grading service).

At the time this was issued, the Free City of Danzig was under the protection of the League of Nations, maintaining a delicate balance between its German-majority population and Poland's growing influence. In 1924, the city's economy stabilized following the introduction of the Danzig gulden, replacing the unstable Papiermark. However, political tensions continued as Poland sought to assert greater control over Danzig's trade and port access. It is an important offering of this important series and one that should be strongly considered. Not previously offered by us, we have only found a few offerings of this type over the past decade, all in Europe, each gathering much attention and we expect the same for this lot.



The next day the major portions of Denmark were liberated by British Troops; Soviet troops relieved the Danish island of Bornholm. The British forces probably carried the **Overkommando** kroner [sic] with them.

It is believed the notes were printed in Great Britain on the same paper as those printed for use in Austria. Individual specimens are sometimes seen but are scarce. Little else is known, and it is believed that these notes did not see widespread use and were soon withdrawn. The first complete specimen booklet we have seen and an exceptional opportunity for collectors of Danish paper money or Allied Military Currency. The booklet is fresh and entirely original and the notes remain in uncirculated condition.







EGYPT. Cassa Mediterranea di Credito per l'Egitto. 10 Piastre, ND (1940). P-M2a. SB402. PMG Very Fine 25 Net. Severed & Reattached, Repaired. The Italian invasion of Egypt began on September 9, 1940, when forces under Marshal Rodolfo Graziani crossed the border from Libya, then an Italian colony, into British-controlled Egypt. The offensive was part of Italy's broader strategy to expand its influence in North Africa and seize control of the Suez Canal, a vital link between Britain and its empire. However, the campaign was poorly executed, hampered by logistical difficulties, inadequate supplies, and low morale among Italian troops. After advancing about 60 miles into Egypt and occupying Sidi Barrani, the Italians halted their advance, giving the British-led Western Desert Force the opportunity to counterattack. In Operation Compass (December 1940-February 1941), British and Commonwealth forces decisively defeated the Italians, capturing tens of thousands of troops and pushing them back into Libya.

While PMG dates the present piece to 1942 a more accurate date is probably 1940. Printed for the *Cassa Mediterranea di Credito per l'Egitto* with the same basic design as seen for Greece and Sudan (see for examples elsewhere in this catalog) it is believed these notes were printed in preparation of the occupation. Due to the lack of success in the short-lived campaign, they are believed to have never entered circulation. A specimen set is known, and we are excited to offer this note, which appears as an issued note. Despite having been severed & reattached, and subsequently repaired, this note presents well, and it is the sole 'issued' example of this note in the PMG population report. Our estimate is just a guess, but to indicate the rarity of notes from this series for Egypt, we must mention that a 5 Lire from this series, severed and with ugly tape repairs, brought \$16,800 elsewhere. Another amazing rarity from this series and a note that is possibly unique. We gave the history of this series in the previous lot, but we will add that the handful of notes in 'issued' format with regular serial numbers that we have seen are all notes that have been severed and reattached, and subsequently repaired (including both notes in this sale from the Al Kugel Collection). We suspect that the notes were meant to be destroyed after the failed invasion, but that somebody was able to snuck out a few notes, perhaps after tearing them up, assuring their survival for the collector community today. This is just speculation, but it would explain both the great rarity of this series as well as the condition the few surviving pieces are found in.

The counteroffensive against the Italians was known as Operation Compass (December 1940 - February 1941). Led by General Richard O'Connor, British and Commonwealth troops launched a surprise attack, quickly capturing Sidi Barrani, Bardia, and Tobruk. The offensive shattered Italian defenses, leading to 130,000 Italian prisoners and pushing them out of eastern Libya. This defeat forced Germany to send the Afrika Korps to support Italy, escalating the North African Campaign. This note is an extremely rare reminder of that turbulent time of world history and the oft-forgotten chapter of the North African theater in World War II. ETHIOPIA. Bank of Abyssinia. 50 Thalers, 1.6.1929. P-3s. Specimen. PMG Choice Uncirculated 63. The majestic African Lion is seen on this important Bank of Abyssinia 50 Thalers. While this design is seen from time to time on notes from the Bank of Ethiopia, which continued using this design, the earlier iteration for the Bank of Abyssinia represents a world-class rarity the likes of are almost unheard of in the world of paper money. Any collector wishes they could own a note from this historic (privately owned) bank, but few actually do, as the notes are incredibly rare in any form and just do not appear on the market. In our fall 2024 Maastricht Showcase auction, we offered another example of this rare type, graded Choice Uncirculated 64, which sold for \$5,520. This piece is similar in appearance, although it does not have punch hole cancellation (the 64 did have one), and the impression of this piece is sharper, and the colors are a bit more intense. An exceptional piece and a standout note that belongs in an advanced collection.

ETHIOPIA. Bank of Abyssinia. 500 Thalers, ND (1915-29). P-5cts. Color Trial Specimen. PMG About Uncirculated 55. The Bank of Abyssinia in Ethiopia was established in 1905 as a private Egyptian company with headquarters in both Addis Ababa and Cairo. The bank would struggle financially for the next decade, even when its lending rates were a fraction of the predatory lending rates common in the country. Around the same time that the bank became profitable, an issue of 280,000 Thalers was authorized for circulation in Ethiopia. Notes were printed by Bradbury, Wilkinson & Co. in England and would continue to be issued for the next fifteen years.

Unfortunately, the notes proved unpopular with the local population, and, according to a contemporary report of Evelyn Waugh from 1930 (printed in the Dennis Gill reference on the coinage of Ethiopia) the notes were only accepted in the capital or on the railway and were essentially only used by Europeans. When the Bank of Ethiopia was established (a domestic bank to replace the Bank of Abyssinia), the same designs continued to be printed, with the new bank name. Domestic use remained problematic, although over time, the notes saw more use in commerce, especially in larger transactions.

Notes from Abyssinia in any form are extremely rare. This color trial specimen will make a welcome addition to an advanced collection of African paper money. The printing is fresh and the eye-appeal is excellent. Two punch hole cancellations are seen, along with a red BWC specimen seal. These notes were issued in incredibly small numbers and as a result are essentially uncollectible in issued form; this color trial specimen would make a nice alternative, although it would be a stretch to call it common. A wonderful note worthy of inclusion in the finest African paper money collection. PMG Comments "Minor Rust."







The key denomination of the various notes introduced into circulation in the western zones of occupied Germany in 1948, which reset the German economy and indirectly led to the Berlin airlift. This issue, printed by Tudor Press in Boston and issued in August of 1948, circulated alongside the same denomination printed by the American Bank Note Company which was part of the currency reform of June 21st, 1948. The reason for the creation of two different notes of the same series is unknown, and it led to confusion among the general public, leading to very few pieces being introduced into circulation. After the introduction of this type in August of 1948 it was quickly withdrawn, with some sources (including Schwan-Boling) stating that this type only circulated for a few days. It is the rarest type of post-World War II Germany and a note that is surely missing from even the most advanced collections. The present example is a fantastic Gem Uncirculated example with near perfect centering, original paper and fantastic eye appeal. A highlight of the German section of this catalog and a note that should see spirited bidding before the gavel falls on this lot.

The Bank of Bengal was one of three banks established under charters from the British East India Company and acted as the primary banking institution in the Bengal Presidency. The Bengal Presidency was the largest and most important of the three presidencies of British India, which were the British administrative divisions of India.

In 1816, the year that this note was issued, the Bengal Presidency was the economic powerhouse of British India, driving trade, finance, and industry under the governance of the East India Company. Calcutta, its capital, had emerged as a global commercial hub, facilitating the export of textiles, indigo, saltpeter, and especially opium, which played a crucial role in British trade with China. The region's agrarian economy was deeply intertwined with Company policies, as revenue collection from land taxes provided a steady stream of income for the British administration. The Bank of Bengal (established as the Bank of Calcutta in 1806 but renamed by 1809) played a pivotal role in stabilizing financial transactions, issuing early forms of banknotes that were gradually gaining circulation. Meanwhile, infrastructure development, including the expansion of river transport and port facilities, reinforced Bengal's status as the commercial heart of British India

As virtually always for early Indian notes, this piece has been stamp and cut cancelled, but most of the printed segments of the note remain intact. It is important to note that note does not appear to have been severed at any point, which is very unusual as many of these were sent by post in two separate parcels and subsequently rejoined once both halves were received. 

It is uniface, and is a lovely design with a harbor scene at the top. While officially known as *The* Bank of Mona, the bank's name appears on this essay as *Bank of Mona*, with 'The' committed. It appears that this design was never issued and the harbor scene was replaced by a more mundane vignette of the bank's coat of arms flanked by a lion and unicorn. 





The obverse of this design retains some features of the well known 1953 design such as the predominant colour and the legal text panel, but owing to the Independence of Malaysia and Singapore, the portrait of Queen Elizabeth was substituted by T.A. Rahman and the state emblems on the reverse replaced by the Government Offices building, fully integrating indigenous Malay elements into the design. For reasons unknown, no notes of 1958 were ever issued and the only \$50 issued by MBB would be the one issued in 1953. Therefore, this pair of printer's model is an important historical artifact and most certainly an item for the advanced collector of MBB material.

The Board of Commissioners of Currency, Malaya and British Borneo dollar was used in Malaya, Singapore, Sarawak, North Borneo, Brunei and the Riau Archipelago from 1953 to 1967 and replaced the Malayan and Sarawak Dollars at par. The monetary union ended in 1967 when the countries became independent from each other and the notes ceased to be legal tender on 16th January 1969.

NEW ZEALAND. Government Expeditionary Force. 10 Shillings, 21.9.1914. P-Unlisted. PMG Very Fine 25. The first of two extremely rare pay warrants issued by the New Zealand Government Expeditionary Force that are offered in this sale, pedigreed to the Al Kugel Collection. Very little information is known about these, and notable numismatists have sought information about these notes to no avail. The Government Expeditionary Force was a cavalry unit assembled in New Zealand in the early days of World War I to help the British during the War. Just over 100,000 soldiers and nurses from New Zealand fought in the war, mostly on the Western front. These two pay warrants appear to have been sent to England, and were perhaps used to pay salaries, at a time when circulating coinage was scarce. However, due to the rarity of these and the limited information we have available, anything is speculative at this point until further information can be unearthed. We have only seen one other example of the 10 Shillings. PMG Comments: "Minor Rust."

NEW ZEALAND. Government Expeditionary Force. 1 Pound, 21.9.1914. P-Unlisted. PMG Choice Fine 15 Net. Rust Damage. Another denomination of this New Zealand pay warrant dating back to World War I, this piece represents a rare and historically significant artifact from the era. As mentioned in the previous lot, very little information is available about these warrants, which appear to have been printed in Wellington and then forwarded to London for distribution. Their exact purpose remains uncertain, though they were likely used for military-related expenditures, possibly for paying soldiers' salaries, settling accounts with suppliers, or covering other operational costs incurred by the New Zealand forces abroad. The 1 Pound denomination seen here has never been reported before, and is possibly unique.

The New Zealand Expeditionary Force (NZEF) was the primary military force sent by New Zealand to fight in World War I. Formed shortly after the outbreak of war in August 1914, the NZEF consisted of volunteers who served alongside British and Australian forces. The force first saw action in the Gallipoli Campaign in 1915. After Gallipoli, the NZEF was reorganized into the New Zealand Division, which fought on the Western Front in battles such as the Somme (1916), Messines (1917), and Passchendaele (1917), earning a reputation for bravery and effectiveness. The Mounted Rifles Brigade also served with distinction in the Sinai and Palestine Campaign, aiding in the defeat of Ottoman forces. By the war's end, over 100,000 New Zealanders had served, with nearly 17,000 killed and many more wounded. This 1 Pound is an important survivor from that turbulent time in history. PMG Comments "Rust Damage."

We have offered this Pick number exactly once before, in our August 2023 showcase auction, when the sole other example graded by PMG brought \$6,000. That note, graded Very Good 8 NET by PMG was repaired and had pieces added. In comparison, the present piece, graded a problem-free Choice Fine 15 by PMG, is a much more desirable and nicer example of this extremely difficult type from the early 20th century.

This series was printed by Waterlow, Bros. and Layton, which was a firm that existed from 1877 to 1920, when it reunited with Waterlow & Sons, which explains why this type has a similar albeit different appearance to other Waterlow products of the era. At left is a portrait of Máximo Jerez, a 19th-century politician, lawyer, and political leader considered one of the great Liberal political thinkers of the region and a proponent of Central American unionism. Two engraved signatures and a third that has been stamped are seen. As mentioned above, the note is in entirely original and problem-free condition and remains fully intact despite considerable circulation. A note that is no doubt missing from even the most advanced Nicaraguan collections and an important opportunity for the specialist.



At the time, the Colony and Protectorate of Nigeria had combined several British possessions in West Africa under a single unity. It would last until 1960, when Nigeria gained its independence. The whole story is a fascinating read, and a recently published article by Jonathan Callaway (Alves Reis and the Portuguese Banknote Case: A Numismatic Analysis published in the IBNS Journal, Vol. 63, Number 4, 2024) is a must-read for anyone interested in an overview of the case. In the article many details are found on how to identify the legitimate printing ordered by the Bank of Portugal with the notes ordered by Alves de Reis. This Gem Uncirculated example, which has been cancelled, features the hallmarks of a Reis printing.

RUSSIA—NORTH RUSSIA. Chaikovskiy Government. 500 Rubles, 1918. P-S143. PMG Choice Very Fine 35. This is an exceptional offering and one that gives collectors one more opportunity to acquire this rare type. In 1918, northern Russia was in considerable upheaval. Allied troops had landed in Archangelsk and Murmansk to support White Army forces against the advancing Red Army, but this effort would ultimately be in vain. By 1919, the Allies had withdrawn from northern Russia, leaving the White Russian Northern Army alone to face the more disciplined Red Army. The region eventually fell to Bolshevik control in early 1920.

During this time the government in North Russia was led by Nikolai Tchaikovsky, a chemist who as a student had become involved in politics, although in Russia in the 1870s that political involvement was difficult for any young man thanks to the regime of the time. In 1874 Tchaikovsky came to the United States and formed a short-lived communist settlement in Kansas. He returned to Europe in 1879 and settled in England. In 1907 he returned to Russia and was promptly arrested for conspiracy against the government. He was released in 1910 for lack of proof and expressed anti-Bolshevik sympathies during the Russian revolution.

After being a member of the Constituent Assembly in Russia Tchaikovsky was one of the founders of the "Union of the Reconstruction of Russia", which organized in 1918 and was a group of anti-Bolshevik communists. When in August 1918 Arkhangelsk, capital of the region, was occupied by the White Army it was Tchaikovsky who became president of the region. Under his leadership, the provisional government issued a series of notes for circulation during the following years, including this 500 Rubles. Like the 1919 issue with the same design (Pick-S150) it is extremely rare. We sold a remainder without signatures of this 1918 issue back in 2021 for \$13,200 and an issued 1919-dated example graded VF35 for \$16,800 last year. Fully issued, it is the finest of just three notes in the PMG population report with the 1918 date. Its only negative comment is for a previous mounting, but it is minimal and not distracting. An absolutely wonderful example of this rare and iconic issue from one of Russia's most turbulent regions during the Russian Civil War and a note surely missing from even the most advanced collections. In our January 2025 NYINC auction, we offered an example of the only type of this rare draft for the British Military Mission in Trans-Caspia listed in the Pick catalog. That note, identified as P-S1148a, saw intense bidding and brought \$12,000 at auction. That piece was dated 4.12.1918. Now, in this sale, we have two more notes from this mission, but both of which have slightly different dates and designs. We will copy our description of our January catalog here to provide more historical background information:

Listed in the Pick catalog under Russia, these drafts were printed for the British Military Mission in Trans-Caspia, today known as Turkmenistan. In 1918, a small garrison of British forces was sent to the region under the command of General Wilfred Malleson to protect British interests in the area and their allies against possible German and Turkish advances. The Malleson mission took place between August 1918 and April 1919. The British forces operated against Bolshevik forces in the region by assisting the Askhabad Committee, a group of the Whites in control of anti-Bolshevik factions that had seized power in Ashgabat in July 1918. This was seen by the Bolsheviks (the Reds) as the British assisting the White Army, further contributing to hostilities in the region.

In the fall of 1918 concerns arose how to raise funds for the troops as an acute shortage of cash had arisen. Malleson took matters in his own hands in December of that year by printing these drafts, which were payable three months after the date for 500 Roubles. The design of the notes was simplistic, as could be expected, with English text on the top and Russian text at the bottom. Dick Ellis, a British Officer, wrote a first-hand account of the mission in 1963 that details some more details behind these drafts:

The scheme now under consideration provided for the issue by the Mission of promissory notes for a specified period payable on maturity in roubles. These notes, issued with the authority of the British government, their repayment guaranteed by the British Mission and the Transcaspian government, would circulate as currency during their period of validity, during which time the Transcaspian government would issue its own currency to an agreed amount. At the same time it was proposed that the British Mission would provide a silver bullion reserve to sustain the Transcaspian currency, which, however, would be based on the value of state property and enterprises. At maturity the Transcaspian government would make available roubles of its own currency for repayment of the promissory notes.

The plan was accepted, and an unknown quantity of the drafts were printed and issued, signed by Captain J.B. Haines, who spoke some Russian. Most appear to have been redeemed, and surviving examples are very rare. We have only seen two appear at auction in recent history, and at present, this is the sole example in the PMG population report. The British withdrew from the area by April 1919. Without British support, the Transcaspian forces were at a disadvantage, and by 1920 the Bolsheviks had gained control of the territory. An incredible opportunity for the specialist. PMG Comments "Tape Repairs."

The Saar region, with its capital of Saarbrücken, had been part of both Germany and France during its early history and had become important for Germany during the industrial revolution when it developed heavy industries. After World War I, Great Britain and France occupied it, but in 1935 it rejoined Germany. After World War II it was again occupied by France, and in 1947 the Saar Protectorate was established, which would last for a decade before the region once again became part of Germany as the state of Saarland.

The Saar Mark was the official currency of the Saar Protectorate when it was introduced on June 16, 1947, replacing the German mark in circulation at the time. Six denominations were introduced, ranging from 1 Mark to the 100 Mark offered here. The series circulated for a very brief time, as by November 15, it had been replaced by the French Franc as Saar had been integrated by then with the French economic system. According to some sources the Saar Marks and their brief period of circulation was used as a way to measure the size and importance of the Saar economy. After the introduction of the Franc in the region, the Saar Marks were exchangeable for French Francs for the rate of 20 Marks to 1 Franc until 15 January 1948.

Not surprisingly, Saar banknotes denominated in Marks are scarce, with the higher denominations downright rare. That certainly applies to the 100 Mark offered in this lot. It is one of just three issued notes of this denomination present, is the sole finest in the PMG population report, and the only example graded uncirculated. Its eye-appeal and originality is more akin to a specimen than to an issued note of this series. Highly important and desirable, this note will be the crowning addition to an advanced collection of France, Germany or Saar. Not to be missed.



The British Solomon Islands were a remote outpost of the British Commonwealth established as a protectorate in 1893. It would take until 1916 that the first currency specifically for the Solomon Islands was introduced, consisting of four denominations with the same basic design (5/Shillings, 10/- Shillings, 1 Pound and 5 Pounds), printed uniface by Thomas de la Rue in different colors. This is a wholesome, circulated example of the first denomination, one of just a handful of issued notes of this type graded by PMG as of the time of cataloging and an excellent representative of the type. While we have offered this type in the past, we have never offered an example of this first date, until now

The issuance of paper money in the British Solomon Islands was a very limited affair. First of all, the notes were not for use by indigenous people, and in fact, payments to native laborers in these notes was explicitly not allowed. This type was issued with three different dates, and the present example features the first date. Each date had a print run of just 2,000 notes (although only 1,546 notes of the final date are believed to have been issued), meaning that for the entire type just 6,000 notes were printed. Not surprisingly, notes from this series are a welcome addition to any advanced Commonwealth collection. SUDAN. Cassa Mediterranea di Credito per il Sudan. 1 Lira, ND (1940). P-M4s. SB504s. Specimen. PMG Choice Uncirculated 64. A second note from this extremely rare series and like the last possibly unique in private hands, and the sole example in the PMG population report. An exceptional rarity from the early days of World War II from a region that saw fairly limited fighting, but which was under pressure from both Germany and Italy at various points in the war. Italy briefly occupied parts of Sudan in 1940 as part of its East African campaign. After declaring war on Britain and France in June, Italian forces launched an offensive from Italian East Africa (modern-day Ethiopia, Eritrea, and Somalia) into Sudan and Egypt, targeting the strategic town of Kassala on July 4. The Italians, numbering around 6,500 troops, managed to capture Kassala and nearby areas but did not advance further due to logistical challenges and strategic caution. However, their occupation was short-lived; by January 1941, British and Commonwealth forces, supported by Sudanese troops, launched a counteroffensive. Facing superior numbers and firepower, the Italians quickly retreated, and Kassala was recaptured on January 18, marking the beginning of the broader British-led campaign that would ultimately expel Italian forces from East Africa by mid-1941. A few notes of this unissued series have appeared on the market in recent years. This example is pedigreed to the Al Kugel Collection and has not been offered elsewhere. An extremely important opportunity and not to be missed. PMG Comments "Previously Mounted."

Dated 1881 and printed on thin, translucent paper (perhaps most similar to rolling paper, used for cigarettes), this note is clearly a trial piece, and it is believed that it is printed in different colors to the issued notes, although the latter are so rare that we have not been able to independently confirm this. As such, it is possible that this piece should be classified as a color trial specimen as well. A high quality printing, from carefully produced plates, this is clearly a product by the government printer of Sweden.

From the little information that we have been able to gather on this piece, it appears that a handful of these were made as a trial, and subsequently distributed to dignitaries. Again, due to the rarity of this type, information is sparse, and the various references on Swedish notes don't add much information. As such, we suspect that there are few collections of Swedish notes that contain this type, and this is an offering that should not be considered lightly if you are a collector of world-class rarities or trial notes. Any notes from the 1935 series are very rare. In many instances, a collector can look at specimens for a more affordable alternative. Unfortunately, when it comes to notes from Tannu Tuva, this does little to help, as the specimens are almost as rare as the issued notes, and demand for any notes from here has kept most of these in advanced collections (and there aren't many to begin with).

A popular denomination from a heavily-collected locale. The 1940 Tannu Tuva series was printed in Moscow and consists of world-class rarities that should amaze even the most advanced collectors of the region. While, as a whole, the 1940 series is not as rare as the 1935 series, this really only applies to the 1 Aksha denomination. Any of the higher denominations are extremely rare, and it takes a collection such as that of the late Al Kugel to make these notes available to the next generation of collectors.

Tannu Tuva today is as remote and almost as rural as it was in the 1940s when it was an independent republic that was only recognized as an independent nation by the Soviet Union and neighboring Mongolia. Most families were self-sufficient and the only major city was Kyzyl, which was also its capital. At the time this note was issued, the population of Tannu Tuva was never more than 95,000 people in an area the size of the US State of Wisconsin. An incredible note, with fresh paper, excellent color and light circulation, and an excellent opportunity for the specialist.

The extremely challenging date of this first date, which was issued with dates between 1937 and 1940. Printing records reveal that just 1,500 notes were printed of the 1937 date seen here, followed by a 1939 printing. The most commonly seen date, 1st March 1940, had a (in comparison) massive print total of 27,200 notes, and that is indeed the date most commonly encountered, although we cannot call this type common by any means, as opportunities to acquire it are few and far between.

Notes issued by Barclays Bank (Dominion, Colonial and Overseas) made up a large part of the money supply in the Caribbean in the 1920s and 1930s. A standard design was issued, with overprints indicating their place of issue. Not surprisingly, quantities printed for the \$100 notes were small, as the general population had little need for notes with such massive purchasing power. As a result, few were printed, and even fewer were kept. While neither the Pick catalog nor PMG differentiates the different dates, we must mention that this is the first time we have seen this particular date appear at auction in recent history. A prime opportunity for the specialist and not to be missed.

The 1953 TDLR series is often referred to as the "Bolivar Orejon" (Bolivar of the big ears) series because of the redesigned portrait of Simon Bolivar. Venezuela decided to switch from ABNC to TDLR for the 1953 series, with TDLR keeping some of the same motifs as their predecessor, while also making some of their own stylistic changes. This big change came to Bolivar's portrait (ABNC had used the same portrait design since 1862 on Colombia P-75, so holders of currency had been used to seeing the design for nearly a century). TDLR changed Bolivar's hair, forehead, chin, and ears, and this was something that was controversial to Venezuelans, referring to the design as "Bolivar feo" (the ugly Bolivar). TDLR quickly pulled the series after facing controversy, leaving collectors with few pieces to acquire today. This date had the lowest print run of the series, just 48,000 notes, and is surely missing from even the most advanced Venezuelan collections.


