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The Alfred Kugel Collection



Alfred Kugel, of Hinsdale, Illinois, was one of philately's preeminent military postal historians. His great interest was in the envelopes that carried mail to and from battlefields, "actions," and their aftermaths, particularly in Europe between 1900 and 1950. He avidly sought material whose addresses and postal markings told the story of the events with which he was concerned.

His scholarship and his ability to acquire outstanding material were brilliantly displayed in over 50 multiframe and 100 single-frame exhibits, many of which won gold medals at various levels, including national and international stamp shows. He was also a prolific philatelic author, was a nationally accredited exhibits judge, and was deeply involved with many of the hobby's top organizations.

The same focus is seen in the banknotes offered in this sale, mainly acquired by Mr. Kugel between 25 and 50 years ago. Principally from European countries, the banknotes are from areas and periods of political and military turmoil: wars, occupations, the emergence of new political entities, etc. Included is material from Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Danzig, Estonia, Fiume, Germany, Latvia, Romania, Russia, Tannu Tuva and Ukraine. Non-European material includes banknotes from China (especially the German-Asiatic Bank), German East Africa, Japan (especially after the 1905 war with Russia: occupation of Siberia, etc.), New Caledonia and New Hebrides.

The items include early ad-hoc notes and beautifully engraved notes (both issued and in proof and specimen form). Many of these are scarce or rare, and some appear to be unique. Many complete sets are included. The condition of the items is noteworthy; most appear to be XF or uncirculated. Those of lesser condition are probably scarcer banknotes, for which these are the "best available."



The Jerry and Diane Fishman Collection

Jerry Fishman was a born collector. From a young age he was drawn to all types of collectibles but was mostly influenced by his father, Al Fishman, who was an avid collector of stamps and coins. However, Jerry took it to a higher dimension. His passion provided a life of adventure, as he sought out treasures for his collection in numismatics.

Together he and Diane, his wife of 51 years, went on a decades-long hunt to build one of the most extensive collections of Palestine Mandate currency and high quality Palestine coins. At one point, their collection included two issued examples of the Palestine 100 pound note – a 1927, and a 1929 – out of four known in private hands. His coin collection included the unissued Palestine 1 mil and 5 mils of 1947, and the three types of Israel 8 grain Agora coins.

In 2012, together with his partner Phil Doudar, he acquired the Kagan-Maremba collection of Palestine and Israel coins and banknotes that was offered at Sotheby's. That collection included a third issued Palestine 100 pound note.

His pursuit also extended to British Commonwealth issues, and he amassed a large group of issued and specimen banknotes from throughout the British empire. One noted banknote that he loved is an issued Fiji 20 pounds 1954.

Jerry was always proud to own and live in the Gingerbread house in the Bay Ridge area of Brooklyn, New York, a recognized historical landmark. Jerry had the most incredible sense of humor and was always the life of any party. He was also a dog lover, always in his element when with his rottweilers.

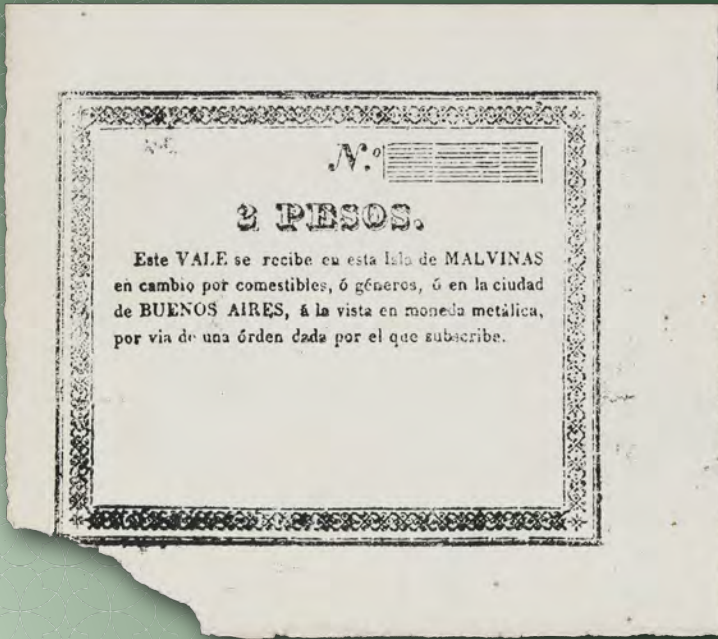

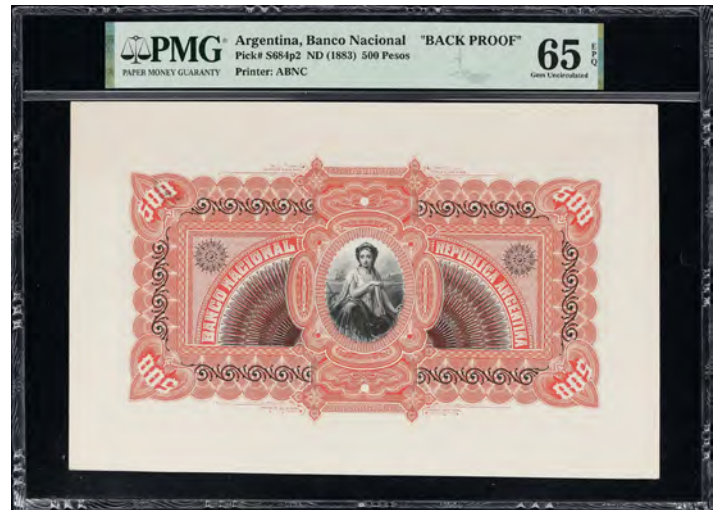

ARGENTINA. Banco de Buenos-Ayres. 1 Peso, ND (1827-29). P-S328a. PMG Very Fine 20. A curious provisional issue that features the portrait of Simon Bolivar and George Washington, two men who had little if anything to do with Argentina. According to Bauman, this provisional issue was first ordered in 1825 from Fairman, Draper, Underwood & Co. in Philadelphia but could not be delivered for several years due to the Brazilian blockade of Argentinean ports. To save time, the Banco Nacional requested the printer to use vignettes already prepared, which led to the odd designs. Issued notes from this series are rare, with this example surpassed in the PMG population report by just two finer examples. PMG Comments “Tape Repair, Tear.”

ARGENTINA. Banco Nacional. 500 Pesos, ND (1883). P-S684p2. Back Proof. PMG Gem Uncirculated 65 EPQ. Desirable Gem Uncirculated back proof pasted on oversized cardboard, as was typically done for uniface proofs such as this. An attractive example.

ARGENTINA. Banco Nacional. 500 Pesos, ND (1883). P-S790bp. Back Proof. PMG Choice Uncirculated 63. While PMG deems this ‘Unlisted,’ Bauman lists this as the back of Pick-S790 (his number BN-168p), and as the description appears to match (vignette “Mule Train #2” at right) we will list it as such. An attractive example that may not be available in any other form. PMG Comments “Specimen Overprint Included, Minor Stains.”

ARGENTINA. Banco de Mendoza. 1/2 Real Moneda Boliviana, 1.1.1877. P-S1748a. PMG Very Fine 30. In existence from 1871 to 1877, the Banco de Mendoza was a commercial bank founded by a group of local merchants and farmers. In its lifetime, it printed a handful of different notes, most of which are rare. Curiously, while printed by Argentinean printers, several designs of this final 1877 series are straight copies of notes produced by the American Bank Note Company for other banks. Amidst financial troubles, the bank had closed by November of 1877. This is a moderately circulated but entirely problem-free example with good originality.

ARGENTINA. Banco del Rio de la Plata. 5 Pesos Plata Boliviana, 3.10.1868. P-S1837a. Low Serial Number. PMG Choice Fine 15. An attractive example of this scarce issue from Argentina. This example has a blue handstamp at right indicates that this low serial-numbered note was issued at the bank's branch in Concepción del Uruguay, which opened in 1868. This is only the second time we've offered this particular Pick number, and the last time was way back in 2014. A desirable problem-free example with good eye appeal for the technical grade.

ARGENTINA. Banco del Comercio de Guleguay. 1/2 Real Plata Boliviana, 1.7.1869. P-Unlisted. PMG Very Fine 25. Bauman ENR-163. The initial denomination of the only series of this institution, printed by A. Larsch of Buenos Aires. Little is known of the issuer or its notes, all of which are rare and seldom offered. This example presents much better than the piece pictured in Bauman and is entirely problem-free, with good paper quality and nothing but honest circulation. This is the first note of this issuer that we have been able to offer.

ARGENTINA. Banco de Londres y Rio de la Plata. 10 Centavos Fuertes, 1.6.1874. P-Unlisted. PMG Very Fine 20. Bauman SFE-95b. Cancelled. An extremely difficult type from this important institution. While Bauman lists uncanceled examples, the note pictured is cancelled in a similar fashion to the note offered in this lot. This institution was founded in 1863 by businessmen from both Argentina and Great Britain with the goal of increasing trade between Buenos Aires and London. While the bank had a fairly substantial banknote issue over the following decade, issued notes are scarce, as a law passed in 1874 disallowed commercial banks such as this to issue paper money, and the notes issued were subsequently withdrawn.

ARUBA. Centrale Bank van Aruba. 500 Florin, 16.7.1993. P-15. PMG Gem Uncirculated 65 EPQ. First date (of two) issued for the highest denomination of Aruba. Now obsolete, and a note that saw limited use at its time of issue, thanks to its high face value and the fact that most tourists on the island use U.S. Dollars. The primary use for this denomination was in casinos. Now scarce and in demand, this will be perfect for an advanced type collection.

BAHAMAS. Bank of Nassau. 4 Shillings, ND (1906-16). P-A8s. Specimen. PMG Choice Uncirculated 64 EPQ. The Bank of Nassau was the first issuer of paper money in the Bahamas. A joint-stock company established in 1889, issued notes of this institution are rare. Remainders are more typically seen, but remain scarce, and specimens such as this are desirable as well. This specimen of the final issue of the bank, as it was absorbed by the Royal Bank of Canada in 1917. It is surpassed in the PMG population report by just a single finer example.

BAHAMAS. Bahamas Government. 1 Pound, 1919 (ND 1930). P-7cts. Color Trial Specimen. PMG Gem Uncirculated 66 EPQ. One of just three color trial specimens of this denomination graded by PMG as of the time of cataloging, with a sole piece finer. An attractive (albeit a bit unusual) purple color is seen on both sides of this note, printed by Waterlow & Sons. Compared to the black and yellow found on the issued notes, this piece stands out, although we can understand why this particular color scheme is not found on many pieces of currency of the period, as one could perhaps even consider it a bit provocative. Still, for the advanced Commonwealth specialist, an important offering and one that appears at auction infrequently.

BAHAMAS. Bahamas Government. 4 Shillings, 1936. P-9as. Specimen. PMG Gem Uncirculated 65 EPQ. Specimen of the first signature variety of this type. While PMG did not differentiate the signatures on specimens at the time this was graded, they are now doing so, and just one example of P-9as can be found in the population report. Of the two, this is the finer example. Signature of J.H. Jarrett as Colonial Secretary Commissioner of Currency at left. An attractive example free of any problems that typically plague specimens of this series.

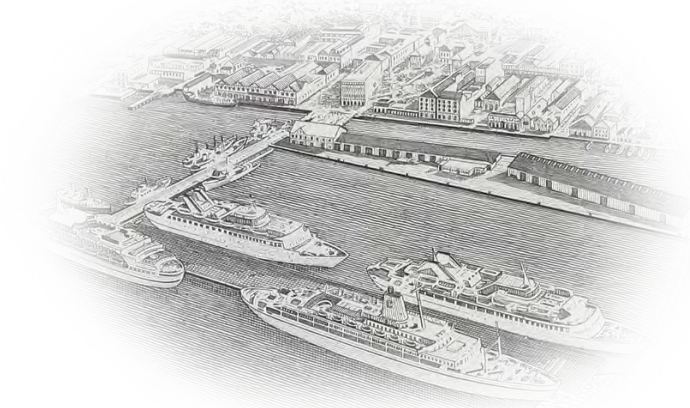
BAHAMAS. Bahamas Government. 10 Shillings, ND (1953). P-14b. PMG Gem Uncirculated 65 EPQ. Second signature variety of Higgs - Sweeting - Burnside. An attractive Gem with strong color for the assigned grade and total originality observed.

BAHAMAS. Lot of (8). Bahamas Monetary Authority. 1/2, 1, 3, 5, 10, 20, 50, & 100 Dollars, 1968. P-26s, 27s, 28s, 29s, 30s, 32s, 33s & CS2(6). Specimens. WBG Choice Uncirculated 64 to Gem Uncirculated 66 EPQ. A complete set of all-zero serial numbers from the 1968 issue of the Bahamas. Some with punch hole cancellations. An attractive set that was handpicked by our consignor for the individual quality of the notes, and while there are no notes graded above 66, it is still an attractive set.

BAHAMAS. Central Bank of the Bahamas. 20 Dollars, 1974. P-39★. Replacement. PMG Very Fine 25. A challenging replacement of this heavily collected series. While regular issued notes of this series are already difficult to find, replacements are another level, especially for the higher denominations. This is the first \$20 replacement that we have had the chance to offer for any of the 1965-74 series. PMG Comments "Annotation."

BAHAMAS. Central Bank of the Bahamas. 20 Dollars, 1974 (ND 1993). P-54a. PMG Superb Gem Uncirculated 67 EPQ. Prefix A. A modern rarity from the Bahamas not to be underestimated. This issue might need some explaining, and unfortunately, PMG has consistently misattributed P-54A as P-54a, so if you go by the population report, you will miss the true rarity of this type. The difference between P-54a and P-54A is found on the engraving of the ships on the back: On this piece, the ships are arranged horizontally in the harbor (as seen on the previous type with portrait of QEII), while on P-54A, they are displayed vertically. While previous auction descriptions have mentioned that prefix A is the first type and later prefixes are the second type, this is not true, as notes with the second back exist with prefix A. Based on previous auction appearances of this type (of which there are not many) we believe this to be one of the finest graded examples of the type.

BARBADOS. Government of Barbados. 5 Dollars, ND (1939-43). P-4s. Specimen. PMG Choice Uncirculated 64. Desirable and very scarce specimen from Barbados. Handwritten annotation in the top margin dates this to 1942. These archival specimens remain very scarce and in many instances, are the most affordable way to acquire certain types. This is one of those types, as any notes of this series are downright rare in uncirculated grades. This \$5 has particularly strong color and typical mounting remnants as the sole grade-limiting factor. The only example of this specimen we offered previously was graded Very Fine 30. PMG Comments "Printer's Annotations, Previously Mounted."

All denominations share the same design, with a vivid depiction of Kaieteur Falls at center flanked by a toucan on the left and the colonial seal at right. On the back is a portrait of King George VI, an unusual layout among British colonial issues, where the monarch's likeness is typically featured on the front. The Kaieteur Falls, one of the world's most powerful waterfalls, was decided to be placed on the front, even though its location in the interior of the country makes it difficult to access, even today (although a small airstrip nearby has certainly made travel there easier).

By the early 1940s, British Guiana was still economically anchored in agriculture and mineral extraction, particularly sugar and bauxite, with commercial activity centered around Georgetown. The \$10 denomination would have been a relatively high-value note in circulation, used for significant commercial transactions and institutional payments. Despite having a larger issue than the two highest denominations, surviving examples are elusive in better grades due to the tropical climate and the practical role these notes played in the local economy. This particular example is the sole finest example in the PMG population report and an exceptional example, with strong color and excellent paper quality. Some staple holes do little to detract from the overall appearance of the note, and if it wasn't for the next two lots, this would easily be a highlight of this section in the catalog. This series remains one of the most iconic in British colonial currency, both for its artistic merit and for its rarity, especially for the higher denominations.

The introduction of the \$20 note in the early 1940s came at a time of increasing fiscal control by British authorities, compounded by global wartime pressures and local monetary conservatism. Currency issuance remained tightly managed, with no central bank and strict fiduciary backing requirements. The rarity of surviving issued \$20 notes today reflects both their low original print numbers and high redemption rates after the war, as British Guiana transitioned toward modern financial systems and eventually took its path toward independence as the country of Guyana.

The opportunity to acquire a \$20 note from British Guiana presents itself very infrequently. This particular example is one of just two notes graded by PMG at this grade level, with two others graded as well. Your cataloger has personally seen three of the four notes, and of the trio, the present piece has by far the best paper quality and appearance. The color is intense, and despite spending some time in circulation, it retains exceptional eye appeal. The \$100 denomination stands at the pinnacle of one of the most iconic series of the British Commonwealth and is the rarest and most elusive of all notes issued for British Guiana. While the design is consistent with the rest of the series, its primary significance lies not in its layout (although many would consider this one of the most beautiful series of banknotes of the period), but in its technical and financial context. This series was issued when British Guiana lacked a central banking institution, and paper money was issued under strict colonial oversight. Even in the early 1940s, British Guiana was an outpost of the British Colonial Empire, and with the rest of the world engaged in World War II, it was mostly left to its own with little outside interference.

The need for a \$100 note in such an environment was marginal. The entire colony had a population of about 325,000 people at the time this note was issued. Though rich in natural resources such as bauxite and sugar, the colonial economy was small in scale and highly localized, with limited instances requiring such high-value instruments. It is likely the \$100 served primarily in interbank settlements, government accounting, or export-related commercial transactions. The original print run is undocumented, but circumstantial evidence suggests it was exceedingly low, as evidenced by the near-total absence of surviving issued examples. Redemption rates would have been high, particularly since many such notes may have been exported from the colony and subsequently turned in abroad.

Out of an abundance of caution, we will not claim this piece as unique, but an extensive search of the available literature has revealed only specimen examples of this issue, typically distinguished by a vertical perforated or stamped "SPECIMEN" marking. The note offered in this lot is the sole entry in the PMG population report at the time of cataloging. Its rarity cannot be overstated, and its appearance marks a milestone opportunity for advanced collectors of British Commonwealth currency. An ink annotation on the back impacts nothing of the printed design. The color is strong, and there are no tears, repairs, or other major issues worth mentioning. Without a doubt, one of the key highlights in this sale and an exceptional opportunity that many have been waiting for. Following a short-lived series of paper money introduced for British Honduras in 1894 in an effort to make its currency more aligned with the United States (one of its primary export partners) a more permanent series of notes was introduced the following year. This \$10 is from the series that followed that, with updated colors and the printer's imprint on the front in the bottom margin. Otherwise, the notes are identical to the previous series, which had already been in circulation for almost three decades by the time this piece entered circulation. This would be the final series of notes printed for the colony (which would eventually become the modern country of Belize) without the portrait of the monarch.

By the 1920s, British Honduras remained a small, underdeveloped colonial economy centered on forestry, particularly mahogany and chicle, exported primarily to the United States. The overhaul of the colony's currency system in 1894 had aimed to simplify trade and fiscal administration, but local reliance on barter and specie persisted well into the 20th century. Issued notes of any denomination were printed in small quantities to meet modest commercial demand.

While specimens of a \$50 and \$100 are known to exist, it is believed that the \$10 seen here is the highest denomination that exists in issued form. This is the sole example in the PMG population report, although we are aware of at least one other example, in similar condition as the piece offered here. A 1928-dated printing may have taken place, but no issued examples dated 1928 are known to your cataloger, and it is unclear if any have survived. The note offered in this lot has moderate signs of circulation. It comes with good color and paper quality. Two small specks of rust are seen, although they are well-hidden and have not eaten into the paper. An exceptional opportunity for the Commonwealth specialist, an extremely rare note, and a note that should be strongly considered, as we don't expect to repeat this offering anytime soon. This is the second to last issue, introduced in 1846, and is listed in Charlton as the Perkins, Bacon and Petch Issue of 1846-1854. This note is of the first variety, with a manuscript serial number applied at the time of issue.

Exact figures of known examples are not known to your cataloger. However, to give an indication of the rarity of this issue, just two notes of this type are graded by PMG: one with the manuscript serial number (offered here) and one with printed serial number. Of the two, this is the finer example. It has nothing but honest circulation, and the manuscript signatures and serial number are clearly visible. No distracting rust, pinholes, or writing is seen on either side. A rather curious item that, for lack of more information, we will list under Canada as a Dominion Bank was active there. However, it is possible that this was produced for another country, or perhaps even as a printer’s sample by the printer, Charles Skipper & East (which was based in London and was established in 1827). Needless to say, rare, and the first we have seen.

While it is typically said that beauty is in the eye of the beholder, the 1902-1910 series of the Imperial Bank of Canada is universally heralded as one of the most attractive series of banknotes ever produced for the country. The series, printed by Waterlow & Sons, included five denominations, including three (\$20, \$50, and \$100) that were printed in an unusual but attractive format. The front of the notes featured various members of the British Royal Family on the front, while the back displayed various allegories on the first four denominations, and a view of the building that housed the Imperial Bank of Canada on the \$100.

While this is a very attractive series, unfortunately for collectors, it's also rare. The \$5 and \$10 (of which three different dates of each were issued) are occasionally seen in issued format, although it remains rare as such. The \$20 and 1907 \$50 do exist in issued format (the \$20 was only issued with the 1902 date only, while the \$50 and \$100 were printed with both 1902 and 1907 dates), but they are permanently impounded in institutional collections. That leaves an extremely limited number of proofs and specimens of the three highest denominations in private hands as the only representatives of those three notes that advanced collectors can acquire. Not surprisingly, demand for such specimens is high, and offerings are infrequent at best.

The \$20 denomination features the stately portrait of King George V on the front, and an engraving of a woman with a fruit basket (perhaps a representation of the harvest) on the back. This is one of just three specimens of this denomination in the PMG population report, and it is the first we have offered. The grading service mentions some light staining, but it is extremely minor and limited to the margins only. The paper quality, color, and originality are all of the highest standard. We must mention that of the three highest denominations, we have only previously offered a single specimen (a \$50), which was in similar grade, and brought \$19,200 in January of 2019. Since then, we have not offered any of these until now. A significant opportunity, not to be missed. PMG Comments "Stains."

The bank started issuing banknotes shortly after its establishment, but survivors of most notes are extremely rare. Only the 1897 \$5 and the 1907 \$5 are sometimes seen. Even though they were issued, no notes are known to exist for any of the small number of \$20s, \$50s, and \$100s believed to have been placed into circulation.

When it comes to the \$10, just nine surviving examples are recorded for the 1897, 1907, and 1909 issues, which are the only dates for which this denomination was issued. Of those, four are permanently impounded in institutional collections. Most \$10s in private hands are the 1897 date, with three in private hands. A single example is believed to be in private hands for the 1907 and 1909 dates. However, neither of those two appears to have ever been sold at public auction (the last appearance of a 1897 \$10 was back in June of 2017). Needless to say, the chance to acquire a Traders Bank of Canada \$10 is an important opportunity unlikely to be repeated anytime soon. The 1907 \$10 offered in this lot is a pleasing Very Fine example, with some mounting remnants mentioned by the grading service, which do little to detract from the overall appearance of this piece. The paper is fresh and original, and there are no other issues worth mentioning. PMG Comments “Previously Mounted.”

The Banco del Sur was established in May of 1870 but was short-lived, as it ceased operations in August of 1871. A single series of notes was ordered from the American Bank Note Company and delivered to the bank in October of 1870. Not surprisingly, survivors are rare in any format, and this matching pair of front and back proofs will fill a challenging gap in a collection of Chilean banknotes. In our August 2025 Global Showcase auction we offered a specimen from this bank (which sold for \$28,800), produced in the 1870s by Perkins, Bacon & Co. which we called part of a ‘single series of notes.’ However, as this example shows, another series was at least planned, although it does not appear to have made it past the initial design phase. Carefully prepared by the American Bank Note Company, this model features a variety of printed design elements pasted onto cardboard. This was often the first step in banknote production, and we suspect that it was done by request of the bank, but was never continued past this stage, and we have never seen any other ABNC-produced material for this institution. While the Danilo Parra Ariza reference includes virtually all known notaphilic items from Colombia, this is missing, even in that catalog. An exceptional offering for the Colombian specialist. 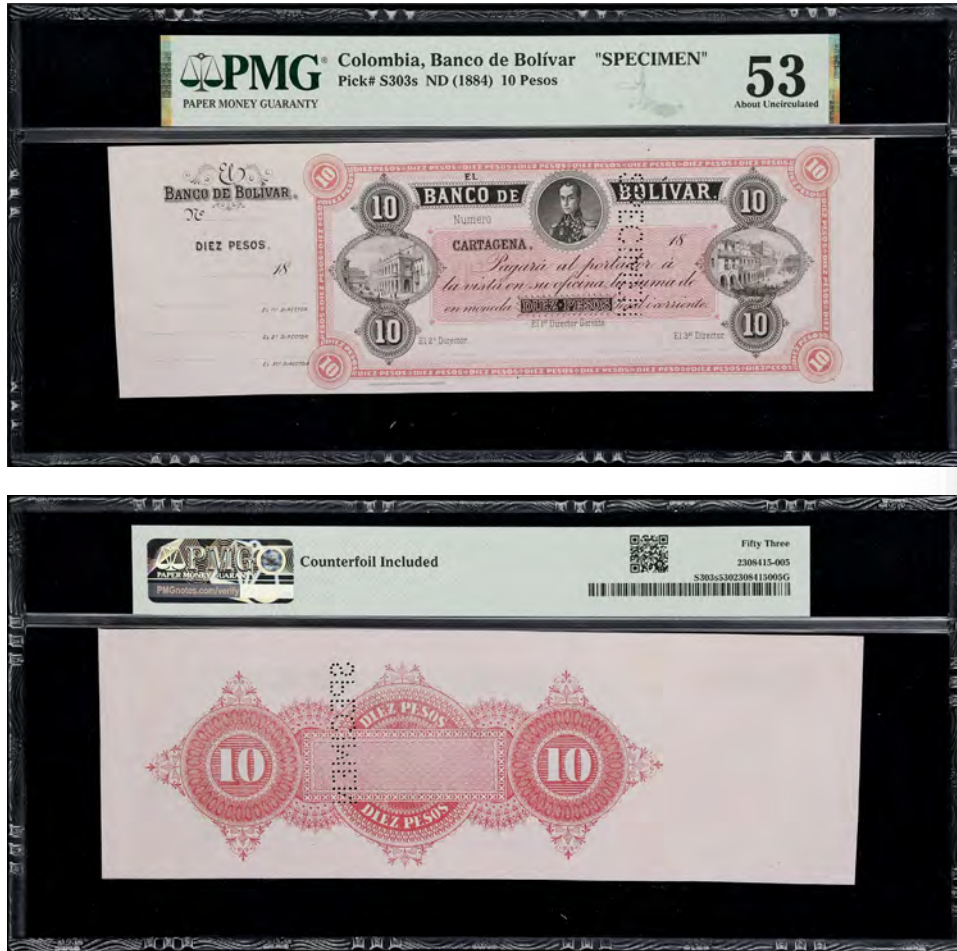

According to the British Museum, they were founded in 1840, possibly as “Maclure, Macdonald & Macgregor,” and were the first to use steam power to operate its printing machines in Great Britain. Unfortunately the PMG population report is a bit confusing as notes of this issue are designated inconsistently under three different varieties (P-S721a, P-S721b and P-S721ar). In reality, there are two basic varieties, both of which are typically in what we consider remainder format (although it is possible they were issued). The first is the note as delivered by ABNC, seen here, with red serial numbers and a red overprint on the back (to be filled in upon issue), DP 7495. The second, also features the Kelly signature, but crossed out in red and is cataloged as DP 7496. Why the masterpiece of the Italian Renaissance appeared on a lower-value Costa Rican note is unknown. Most likely, the vignette was specifically requested from Waterlow & Sons by an employee of the Banco Internacional de Costa Rica who had perhaps seen it on display during travels in Europe. The portrait of Mona Lisa by Leonardo da Vinci saw a resurgence in popularity in the 1930s, including two movies released that decade, based on the 1914 theft of the portrait and subsequent recovery. Still, when it comes to paper money, this is the only note that ever featured the portrait, which is now believed to have been Lisa del Giocondo, an Italian noblewoman born in 1479.

While circulated notes of this type are seen from time to time, it becomes much rarer in better grades. We have only handled a handful of notes of this type in grades above AU. This is the first of an amazing (and possibly unique in this grade) consecutive pair dated 10 March 1936. This date had a print run of just 25,000 notes, with serial numbers between 845001 to 870000, with signatures of Carlos Brenes Ortiz and Julio Peña Morúa. An exceptional offering, and when combined with the next lot, it almost becomes legendary before the sale has even happened.

Theo van Elmpt, in his primary reference work on the series, writes that “all the notes were...formally withdrawn in 1925. That recall, as was usual, was done with great care and nearly all the notes were taken out of circulation and destroyed.” In fact, he mentions that he was only able to locate a single example of the entire issue, although since the publication of his book a few more have showed up. 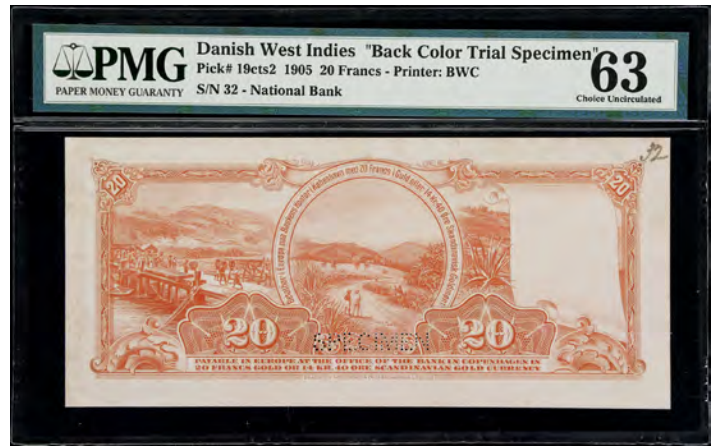

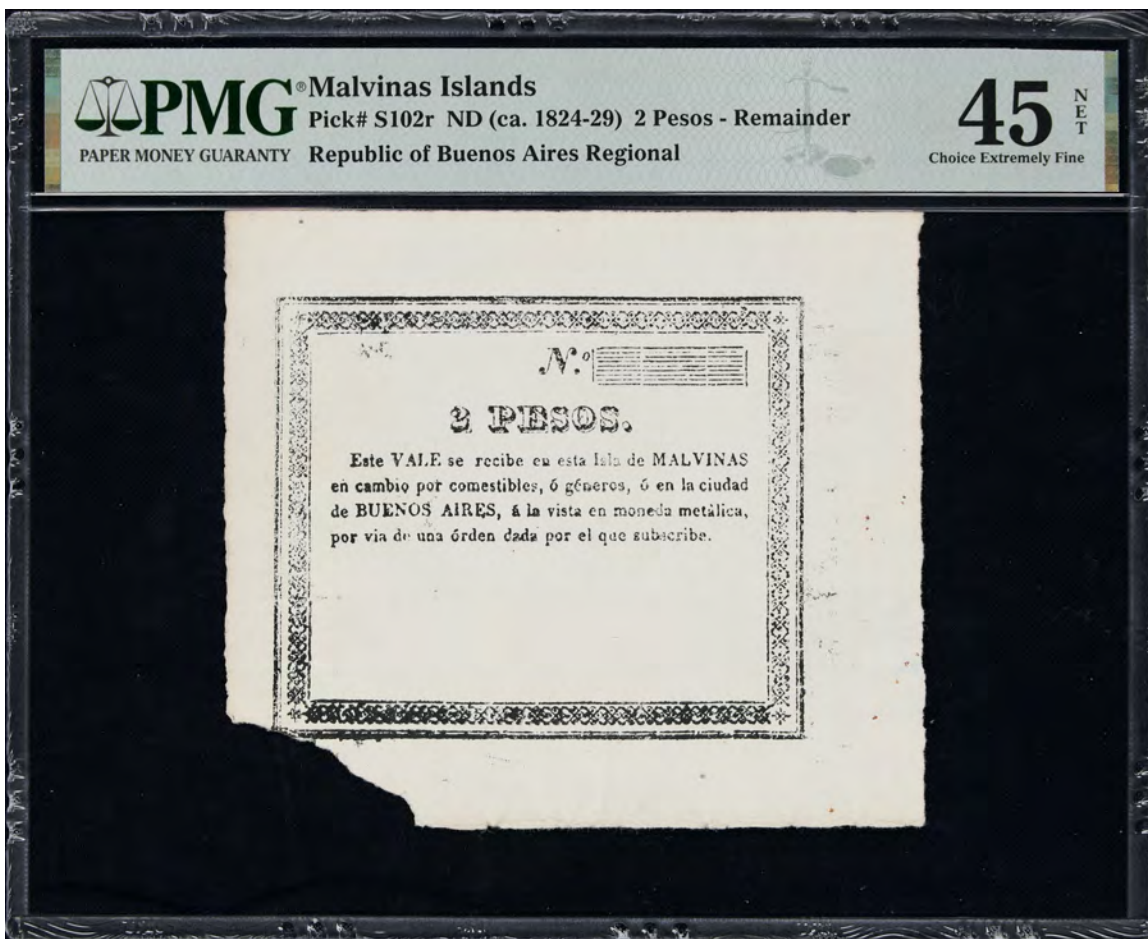

FALKLAND ISLANDS. Isla de Malvinas. 2 Pesos, ND (ca. 1824-29). P-S102r. Remainder. PMG Choice Extremely Fine 45 Net. Corner Missing, Rust. An incredibly historic item. This 2 Pesos note dates to the Argentine administration of the Falkland Islands, referred to here as "Isla de Malvinas," under the authority of Luis Vernet, a German-born entrepreneur who led a settlement effort sanctioned by the Argentine government. In 1823, Vernet obtained rights from the United Provinces of the Río de la Plata to exploit the islands' natural resources (primarily feral cattle left by former colonizers). He established a colony at Puerto Soledad, an abandoned Spanish military outpost and penal colony. The colony's population included gauchos, foreign laborers, and families, and its economy centered on sealing, fishing, and livestock. Vernet also enforced exclusive sealing rights, which brought the settlement into conflict with American commercial interests.

While the Argentine period is brief, it was preceded by a complex history of colonial rivalries in the South Atlantic, the impacts of which last to this day. The French established the first settlement on East Falkland in 1764, naming it Port Louis. The Spanish, claiming sovereignty based on papal authority and continental proximity, established their own settlement at Puerto Soledad in 1767 after compensating the French. Meanwhile, the British had also laid claim to the islands and founded a settlement at Port Egmont on West Falkland in 1765. These overlapping claims led to a diplomatic crisis in 1770, which was temporarily resolved when Britain withdrew its settlement in 1774, leaving behind a plaque asserting sovereignty. Spain maintained its garrison at Puerto Soledad until 1811, when it was evacuated due to the Napoleonic Wars and revolutions in South America. The islands remained unoccupied until Argentine interest revived a decade later.

When Vernet arrived, a few years after a failed settlement effort by American Colonel David Jewett on behalf of the Argentine government, the remains of the Spanish settlement offered a strategic foothold, and the Falkland Islands once again had a (small) population. His settlement was developed with private capital and government backing, and he attempted to establish orderly economic relations and enforce customs regulations. The issuing of notes like this one was part of a broader effort to create a functional economy in an isolated and often self-reliant colony. In 1831, as sealing interests led to conflicts between American and Argentine sailors, the USS *Lexington* arrived and dismantled the colony's military infrastructure, temporarily removing many inhabitants. Although Buenos Aires continued to claim the islands, its authority was never fully restored. In January 1833, a British naval vessel arrived at Port Louis and requested the withdrawal of the remaining Argentine officials, after which Britain took control of the settlement. A permanent British presence was established by 1840, and the islands remained under British administration thereafter.

The issuance of paper currency during Vernet's tenure, including this 2 Pesos note, reflects an attempt to formalize economic life in the colony and reduce reliance on barter or irregular coin shipments from the mainland. These notes would have circulated among the small civilian population and are one of the few tangible numismatic links to the short-lived Argentine administration. Not surprisingly, survivors are rare, even though four denominations (1, 2, 5, and 10 Pesos) are believed to have been issued. For all intents and purposes, only remainders such as this are collectible (one or more issued examples may be found in Argentine museums), but offerings are few and far between. While this example is missing a corner, it retains excellent paper quality otherwise, and virtually the entire print is intact. A note whose rarity supersedes any condition issues, and in your cataloger's not so humble opinion, a true world-class rarity. PMG Comments "Corner Missing, Rust."

Remarkable World War I Issue from the Falklands

FALKLAND ISLANDS. Government of the Falkland Islands. 1 Pound, 28.8.1915. P-A3. PMG Choice Fine 15. This series of the Falkland Islands, although sometimes seen, remains rare and highly sought after. It was introduced in 1899 and would be issued intermittently until the early 1920s. They were printed by Thomas de la Rue in England, featuring counterfoils at the left. Upon issuance, these counterfoils were separated and retained, with the stub and note reunited once the note was redeemed.

This particular example features pen-signed signatures of Claude F. Condell, William A. Harding, and William A. Thompson. Condell had arrived at Stanley in the Falkland Islands in March of 1915. The Scotsman would only be in the Falklands for a few years before he boarded a ship to South Georgia. He allegedly had expressed his desire to leave the Falklands, and when he conveniently could not secure passage back to the islands, he was appointed commissioner in Montserrat. Harding had a more lengthy tenure in the islands and played an important role in the development of the Falkland Islands Company, serving in the Falklands on and off for three decades. Thompson was born in the Bahamas in 1872 and arrived in the Falklands in 1901. Spending 25 years there, he served as Collector of Customs, Postmaster, Harbor Master, Colonial Treasurer, and even Receiver of Wrecks.

The 1 Pound denomination was one of three denominations issued for this series. The serial numbers run continuously, and it appears that they were signed and dated as they were needed in commerce. Early on, the serial number prefix changed from A/1 to B, but the notes are otherwise identical regardless of date of issue. Our best estimate is that over a two-decade period, only about 20,000 notes were issued, which indicates about 1,000 notes per year, but over time, most were redeemed. Despite some minor staining, this is an excellent example and a survivor that was issued in the midst of World War I in a remote corner of the world. PMG Comments "Stains."

GRENADA. Royal Bank of Canada. 5 Dollars = 1 Pound-10 Pence, 3.1.1938. P-S118a. CH #630-50-02. PMG Very Fine 25. Like other Canadian banks, the Royal Bank of Canada expanded into the Caribbean in the early 20th century. What followed were numerous issues for its various branches, often with identical designs, although they were redeemable at one specific office only. This particular example was issued at the Grenada branch in 1938, after the Royal Bank of Canada had established a branch at St. Georges in 1913. This issue followed a note of similar design (but different size) issued in 1920 and was printed by the Canadian Bank Note Company. As is the case with other Caribbean issues from Canadian banks, this type is most frequently encountered as uniface front and back proofs. Issued notes, such as seen here, are rare and seldom encountered. The latest edition of the Canadian note registry lists these Caribbean issues and states that just five examples are known to exist of the 1938 Grenada \$5. One of those is permanently impounded in the National Currency Collection while the others are typically in strong hands. This particular example traces its pedigree back to a JHA sale in February of 1994, and besides the example in the NCC, is the only example with a Very Fine Grade (one note is listed without grade, and the other two are listed as Fine). Modest circulation is seen, but the eye-appeal is excellent, and the paper is free of any problems. It culminates in an attractive and rare example of a challenging type. We must note that this appears to be the first public offering of this type in issued format since 2014, and as can be expected, it is also the sole finest in the PMG population report as of the time of cataloging. Not to be missed.

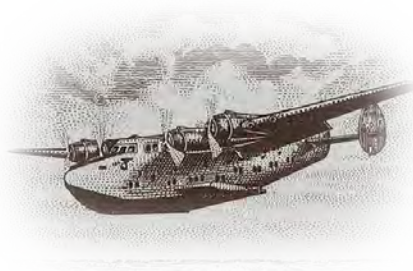

GUADELOUPE. Banque de la Guadeloupe. 500 Francs, ND (1943). P-24a. PMG About Uncirculated 55. The Philadelphia printing firm of E.A. Wright took over production of paper money for many of the French colonies during World War II, when access to mainland France and its printers was disrupted due to World War II. Many of the lower denominations produced by E.A. Wright are relatively available, while others are much scarcer, especially in issued form. This 500 Francs printed for Guadeloupe classifies under the latter category. It is the sole finest example in the PMG population report and is an example of the first signature variety (Marconnet/Gascon/Picard, introduced into circulation in 1943). During World War II, Guadeloupe was initially governed by officials loyal to Vichy France, with Admiral Georges Robert overseeing the island on behalf of the collaborationist regime. In 1943, growing local resistance and Allied pressure led Guadeloupe to ally itself with Free France, marking a key shift in loyalties during the conflict, and André Lebon replaced Robert as Governor. During this same time, this note appears to have been saved by a collector shortly after issuance, and while we must note some mounting remnants on the back, that mounting was no doubt what assured the note's survival at this grade level. Not to be underestimated, and the first example of this type we have ever offered in issued format. PMG Comments "Previously Mounted."

HAITI. French Tresor Public for Saint Domingue. 500 Francs, 1804. P-Unlisted. PMG Extremely Fine 40. Third bill of exchange, valued at 500 Francs, issued in support of the administration of Saint-Domingue, shortly after that part of the island of Hispaniola was recognized as the independent nation of Haiti by most of the world (France would not formally do so until 1825). In our Spring Maastricht auction, we offered the second bill of exchange with the same serial number, which brought \$2,640. This bill is part of a traditional set of up to three originals, designated First, Second, and Third of Exchange, used in international trade to ensure payment could be collected even if one copy was lost in transit. The present piece has a connection with two early U.S. presidents, as it was made out payable to Michael Walton, who has endorsed it on the back. His brother, William Walton Jr, was a merchant in Santo Domingo, appointed commercial agent on behalf of the United States by Thomas Jefferson in 1805, and regularly communicated with James Madison around the time this was issued, mentioning his brother Michael several times in letters archived at the National Archives. Additionally, this bill seems to carry the signature of General Jen-Louis Ferrand, Governor of Santa Domingo from 1803 to 1808, who unsuccessfully tried to recapture the now independent nation of Haiti for the French Crown. A fascinating fiscal item with a strong United States connection. PMG Comments “Ink Burn.”

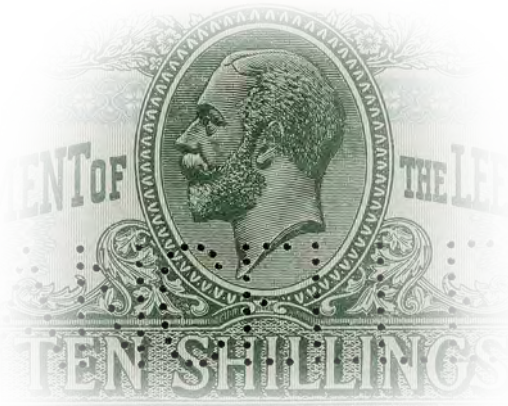

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Spectacular Leeward Islands Specimen A Rare Country in World Paper Money

LEEWARD ISLANDS. Government of the Leeward Islands. 10 Shillings, 1.1.1921. P-2s. Specimen. PMG About Uncirculated 55. The British Leeward Islands were a group of islands in the Caribbean that were collectively governed and for more than a century consisted of the islands of Anguilla, Antigua, Barbuda, the (British) Virgin Islands, Dominica, Montserrat, Saint Kitts, and Nevis. The colony existed, in various forms, from 1671 to 1958. For the first two centuries, coinage came from a variety of sources, ranging from English, Spanish (colonial), and American coins, as well as private tokens. Only in the second half of the 19th century did a few of the islands see any form of paper money. The Colonial Bank had been founded in 1836 with the primary objective to trade in the West Indies, which it did quite successfully for most of the 19th century and into the 20th, until it eventually became Barclay's Bank (Dominion, Colonial, and Overseas) in 1925. The Colonial Bank provided the majority of circulating currency, supplemented by a handful of other banks, although coins remained the primary method of payment. Only in 1921 did the Government of the Leeward Islands issue its first (and only) paper money.

There were three denominations prepared: 2 Shillings 6 Pence (not listed in Pick), 5 Shillings (Pick-1), and 10 Shillings (Pick-2). Only the last two denominations are known in issued format (although extremely rare), although it is likely the first denomination was issued as well. The notes were dated 1st January 1921 and entered circulation in the late summer. The designs of all denomination was identical, showing a profile portrait of King George V on the front and the coat of arms of the Leeward Islands on the back. All three denominations were printed by Thomas de la Rue in England and featured the printed signatures of two commissioners of currency: William D. Auchinleck and Francis W. Griffith.

The opportunity to acquire a note from the Leeward Islands is one of great infrequency and typically only occurs when the greatest collections are sold. No doubt were the print totals small (unfortunately they have not been recorded), the tropical climate in which they circulated did not help their survival, and less than a dozen notes are known in any format. The specimen in this lot is the plate note in the Banknote Book, and may be the sole surviving specimen of this denomination. With the issued notes of this series always in low grade, the grade of this specimen is exceptional, despite a small tape repair and previous mounting. Strong color and few actual signs of handling are seen. An extraordinary opportunity for the Commonwealth specialist, not to be missed, and one we would recommend not to let slip away as another chance may not present itself for many years. PMG Comments "Tape Repair, Previously Mounted."

Sensationally Difficult Type One of the Rarest Notes of This Printer

MARTINIQUE. Banque de la Martinique. 1000 Francs, ND (1942). P-20. PMG Very Fine 30. The sole finest graded in the PMG population report. A deceptively rare issue, printed during World War II by the Philadelphia printing firm of E.A. Wright and Company. This type is seldom offered for sale anywhere, and when it is, it is typically in lower grades. Of the handful of issued notes that we are aware of only the piece pictured in the Pick catalog comes close to the grade of the piece offered in this lot. Pedigreed to the illustrious Al Kugel collection, this is one of those notes that people might glance over, but which, in reality, is a true rarity.

Martinique, like other French possessions, had to look outside of France for a printer that could produce its circulating currency during World War II. For the lower denominations, it utilized E.A. Wright, while the 100 Francs was produced by the American Bank Note Company. For an unknown reason, the 1000 Francs was produced by both, but the output by E.A. Wright (Pick-20) was a fraction of the ABNC counterpart (Pick-21). A rare type we have not offered before, and while not entirely problem-free, still with a strong visual appearance and, more importantly, excellent paper quality. PMG Comments “Pinholes, Stains.”

At this time most of the notes in circulation must have been withdrawn, accounting for their rarity today. This example faces up better than most, while small tears in the margin do little to detract from its overall appearance. When this note was first presented to the collecting community in 2009 as part of the Christensen collection, it had already been a part of the holdings of Amon Carter. It subsequently became part of the Dr. Edward and Joanne Dauer Collection and was last offered by us in May of 2023. Now is your chance to acquire this outstanding condition rarity and add your name to the list of collectors who once treasured this note. In 2009, when the note was first offered (before its certification), the brief auction description called it “fresh and crisp, almost uncirculated thus rare.” Now, after the note has been graded, we certainly have to agree, and clear originality can be seen, with little in the sense of actual circulation visible.

Much of Trinidad and Tobago’s early paper money was issued by various banks of Canadian origin. The Government of Trinidad and Tobago issued its first paper money in 1905. At first, however, its issuance was limited to \$1 and \$2 notes, and a single \$1000 note meant for interbank transfers that the general population would not have used. This series, first issued in 1929, included only the \$1 and \$2 denominations. Only with the next series, first issued in the mid-1930s, were higher denominations introduced as the notes from Canadian banks were phased out and withdrawn from circulation at the same time. Despite its limited face value, this type is virtually always seen in heavily circulated grades. This is the sole finest example in the PMG population report, and the finest we have ever seen or offered. A tremendous opportunity for the Commonwealth specialist.

TURKS & CAICOS ISLANDS. Government of the Turks & Caicos Islands. 1 Pound, 3.12.1903. P-3a. PMG Choice Fine 15. One of the earliest and rarest banknotes issued for the Turks and Caicos Islands, this 1 Pound note is dated December 3rd, 1903, and hand-signed by two Directors of Currency. It represents the highest denomination from this short-lived and rare paper money series, which are counted among the rarest issues of the British Commonwealth. Printed by Thomas de la Rue, the design follows a format typical of small British dependencies at the time, with a plain layout and simple engraving, including a left-side counterfoil which would have been detached upon issue. The left edge of this note still shows the perforation where such a stub was once attached.

At the time this note was issued, the Turks and Caicos Islands were governed as a dependency of Jamaica, and the economy was centered on salt exports. Paper money was issued only briefly and in very limited quantities, with the Banknote Book identifying seven subtypes across three denominations: 5 Shillings, 10 Shillings, and 1 Pound. Surviving issued notes are extremely rare, and the observed serial ranges suggest minuscule print runs. This piece, with a low three-digit serial number and entirely handwritten elements, appears to be the only known example of its specific variety. The signatures are those of Alexis Wynns Harriott and his son, Edmund Cowles Harriott, both of whom served as Directors of Currency. Alexis Harriott was previously commissioner of Salt Cay in the late 19th century, although little else is known about their administrative roles in the release of the island's only currency.

A small number of remainder notes exist, but issued examples are almost never encountered in the collector market. Just one other issued 1 Pound note, dated 1918, has appeared at public auction in recent memory. That piece was notably discolored, while the present note retains strong paper quality, original color, and highly legible inscriptions despite some rust mentioned by the grading service. Its survival in such a well-preserved state makes it one of the most important artifacts from the brief period of local currency in the Turks and Caicos Islands, and among the rarest British colonial notes of the Caribbean region. This is an original note graded Choice Fine 15 by PMG. While some rust damage is observed and mentioned by the grading service, the note does not feature any repairs, and the eye appeal is excellent with a bold date and signatures. With the discolored note selling twice for nearly \$30,000, we would not be surprised if this superior example, with a much earlier (handwritten) date, brings a new record for any note from the Turks and Caicos Islands. Stunning and Rare Sheet of Five Notes Not Previously Offered by Us

An exceptional offering, almost unprecedented, and a historical object destined for either a museum collection or one of the finest collections of Venezuela. While we are no strangers to South American rarities, the only other time we have offered a sheet of this series was as part of the Rosenman collection, which consisted of an uncut sheet of three notes featuring a later signature combination. By contrast, this sheet of five, is more complete, features an earlier set of signatures (Lorenzo Sata, Josef Esteban de Alustiza, and José Joaquín Yarza), is in high grade, and overall an extremely desirable object. It would not be an exaggeration to call this a monumental offering, and we are excited to present it to the collecting community. The uncut sheet in the Rosenman collection brought \$19,200 after a spirited bidding battle, but we will keep the estimate for this at a modest level, to let the market decide what this sheet is ultimately worth.

The First Republic of Venezuela, formed in 1811 following the declaration of independence by seven provinces from Spanish rule, issued the first printed paper money in South America, notes of profound historical importance. Despite its brief existence, ending in mid-1812, the Republic authorized three emissions of paper currency, distinguishable by their signatures and legislative acts, as outlined in the Marcano catalog. Denominations ranged from 2 Reales to 16 Pesos and were printed in Caracas using engraved woodblocks on handmade paper, often with watermarks and increasingly poor quality over time. Their austere design featured the patriotic seal “Pena de Muerte al Falsificador” and referenced the year of independence. A unique numbering system was employed for security, deciphered only in the 1990s, though most surviving notes bear stamped rather than hand signatures. Issued without financial backing and unpopular with the public, these notes were swiftly withdrawn after the Republic’s fall, making all denominations rare and highly significant to collectors of early Latin American currency. Secure Vault Storage for Certified Rare Coins, Banknotes And Precious Metals



Safe-deposit boxes are increasingly hard to find due to a trend in banking to discontinue this traditional storage method. Many current boxes are full, resulting in long waits for available boxes. At the same time, the number of new boxes is being scaled back, bank branches are being closed, and safe deposit boxes are often not included when new branches are opened. This leaves many collectors with the task of finding a secure place for the safe keeping of their certified rare coins, paper money and precious metals. When a safe-deposit box can be acquired, to insure it privately can cost thousands of dollars per year.
